LATEST UPDATE FROM BALAMMA SATRAM When Fr Sarves and Mary Skaag visited our parish recently, they were happy to be given such a warm welcome and to receive the commitment from Gift for Life to support their charity in the future. Mary outlined that the most recent concerns were based on the fact that there has been no rain for six years, causing catastrophic consequences - wells have dried up across an area as large as from Durham to Newcastle. Temperatures are currently 50 degrees and recent winds have blown away so many fragile homes in the region, although thankfully their complex is secure due to good foundations for the buildings. Balamma Satram provides accommodation for 150 people at any one time, namely the following groups in desperate need: the elderly, lepers, those disabled, the sick, victims of accidents; with additional support for others in dire need on occasion. Other groups of the poor who are widows or grandparents give help to the Balamma Satram community which enables their children/dependents to be educated. 54 are in education, 24 are handicapped and the remainder are the elderly. To assist in the longevity of the charity, it has paired with Carmelite Sisters in the province to ensure the continuation of the great work being carried out at Balamma Satram over the next 70 years. Fr Sarves and Mary have worked tirelessly to achieve this aim and offer Masses of ~Thanksgiving to all who support their mission.

JOHN INGRAM PRIEST AND MARTYR 1565 - 1594 In his new book, Fr Zielinski provides the background to the tempest of the Protestant Reformation in England and its impact on the spiritual, social and cultural dimensions of society, including on Tyneside, in order to situate the coming into the country of the seminary priests, such as John Ingram, who had trained abroad and who had to live hunted lives in Elizabethan England which had become a police state with an elaborate spynetwork. The book encourages the general reader to delve more deeply into the findings of Professor Eamon Duffy and Clare (Lady) Asquith, who argue for a more multi-dimensional reading of this period in English history, in contrast to the one-dimensional Protestant version of events in Tudor England. Some of John Ingram's letters and epigrams are included in the book, as well as a photocopy of his student entry and his signature in the Liber Ruba of the English College in Rome, courtesy of Professor Maurice Whitehead, the Schwarzenbach Research Fellow, acting as Archivist in the Archivum Venerabilis Collegii Anglorum de Urbe (The Venerable English College) in Rome.

THE CARDINAL HUME MEMORIAL LECTURE 2019 will be on Thursday 11 July at 7pm in St Mary's Cathedral, Newcastle upon Tyne. This year's lecture, entitled A migrant, pilgrimage people - how the Catholic revival shaped the Church today, will be given by Catherine Pepinster, Religious Correspondent and former editor of The Tablet. The lecture will focus on examining what kind of Church the Catholic Church became after emancipation. It was very much a Church of migrants, especially Irish, in the early days, and it was as much focused on education as worship. Catherine will also look at how churches and schools served the mostly migrant Church and how that has given Catholicism a particular character in the UK. Cardinal Hume will come into the lecture because of his impact on the Church at the national level and how important he thought education was, but also how his interest in serving the homeless is typical of the Catholic Church in this country, a very strong feeling for those struggling in society. Entrance is free and all are welcome.
