Current Diocesan COVID Controls

Until further notice, arrangements for our three churches will be as follows:

SEA SUNDAY This Sunday 10 July is Sea Sunday when the Church prays for all those who live and work at sea. Seafarers and fishers play a vital role in all of our lives, but they often work in difficult, hazardous conditions. In the last year, more crews have been abandoned by their employers than ever before. Many are still being denied the right to leave their ships for even a short break away from the relentless noise and pressure onboard. Many are reporting more stress and poorer mental health.

Your financial support will also make a big difference to seafarers and fishers in need. Stella Maris is the official maritime charity of the Catholic Church and there will be a retiring collection at Masses this weekend to support their work - envelopes are also available if you wish to gift aid your donation. We are short of most produce - even if you can only bring along 1 or 2 tins please bring them along to church to help out.

<u>Priority items</u>: cooking oil, sweets, tinned meat (corned beef, pek, spam), hot dogs, meatballs, chopped tomatoes, fruit, soup, baked beans, custard, rice pudding, all vegetables, potatoes, sugar, long grain rice, UHT milk, squash, crisps, biscuits, tomato purée & toilet roll.

Other items we put into the weekly food bags: laundry powder/liquid, feminine hygiene (tampons), shower gel, shampoo, antiperspirant, toothpaste, tinned kidney beans, chickpeas, pasta, pasta sauce, jam, coffee, tea, tuna & all other non-perishable items.

Every Thursday volunteers are in church between 9.30 -10.30 so parishioners can drop donations off here if they wish - please come in to say 'Hello' and see what we're up to.
