PARISH FINANCE REPORT APRIL - **DECEMBER 2023** The Finance Report for the 9 months to the end of December has been prepared and reveals parish funds have fallen by £3,334 to £255,495 which is an improvement on the first 6 months position.

Income is primarily made up of offertory collections of £43,568 and rental income from St Mary's, Whickham presbytery, hall and cottage of £17,936. Fundraising, donations and votive candles contribute a further £9,965.

Expenditure is spread over a number of categories including utilities (£15,850), staff wages (£13,637), clergy costs (£7,574), diocesan levy (£8,040), repairs (£6,605), insurance premiums (£5,889), gardening services (£3,712), Joe's Place Donation (£1,494), anniversary celebration expenses (£1,177), council tax (£1,574) and various church requisites and parish office costs (£9,252).

One benefit to be received during the 4th quarter of the year (January - March 2024) is the Gift Aid claim for the 2022/23 tax year which should be £8,227. On the downside will be an increase in repair costs with both Immaculate Heart and St Philip's church heaters being replaced and the bell tower at St Philip's in need of essential maintenance. The spectre of St Philip's roof replacement also looms.

Therefore, your ongoing generosity in the form of offertory collections is vital for us to continue our mission and to maintain our buildings in the best condition possible. While it is pleasing to report that the offertory figure of £43,568 is a £1,855 (+4.4%) increase on the same time period last year, it is actually £6,385 less than the pre-Covid closure collections of April to December 2019 – hence the difficulty in growing parish funds.

As a separate item the parish continues to hold monies on behalf of Gift for Life, Foodbank and special collections which total £18,988 at the end of December. Thank you all for your continuing support.

FOOD BANK & REFUGEE UPDATE We welcome all nonperishable produce - even if you can only bring along 1 or 2 tins, please bring them along to church to help out.

FOOD ITEMS IN SHORT SUPPLY: UHT milk, long grained rice, tomato purée, tinned tuna, soup, sweetcorn, carrots, potatoes, mayonnaise, biscuits, antiperspirant, laundry powder/liquid.

Other priority items: dried pasta, pasta sauce, tinned meat (mince, corned beef, pek), hotdogs, meatballs, garden peas, chopped tomatoes, fruit, baked beans, custard, rice pudding, cooking oil, gravy granules, crisps, biscuits, jam, cereal, squash, tomato ketchup, sugar, teabags, coffee, spray cleaner, washing up liquid, feminine hygiene (especially tampons), toilet rolls, shampoo, toothpaste.

Other items we put into the monthly food bags for the Refugee Project: tinned chickpeas & kidney beans.

Every Thursday volunteers are in Immaculate Heart of Mary Church between 9.30am - 10.30am so parishioners can drop donations off then if they wish - please come in to say 'Hello' and see what we're up to. First Reading

Job began to speak:

Remember that my life is but a breath, and that my eyes will never again see joy.
